


INTRODUCTION TO THE PNI PRACTICUM




THIS IS A PROJECT-BASED COURSE

In the PNI Practicum, everyone will carry out **a real PNI project**, and everyone will learn from every project.

I see the PNI Practicum working like a **planetary gear set**, in which a large outer “ring” gear (PNI) is driven by the **connected energy** of a “sun” gear (me) and a group of “planet” gears (you and your projects). Everyone benefits – you, me, PNI, and a whole world of people trying to get along with each other and make decisions together.

DIFFERENCES BETWEEN THE TWO COURSES

- **16** weeks
- Each project will collect **24+** stories
- Each project will involve **6+** project participants
- Story collection will be entirely **conversational**
- You will ask a **few** questions about stories, with mostly free-text answers
- You will use **simple** software (e.g., word processor, spreadsheet)
- There will be **no** narrative catalysis (pattern finding)
- During sensemaking, project participants will work **directly** with the collected stories

PNI Practicum I: Smaller-scale PNI




- **20** weeks
- Each project will collect **100+** stories
- Each project will involve **20+** project participants
- Story collection will be both **conversational** and **survey-based**
- You will ask **several** questions about stories, with mostly fixed-choice and numerical-scale answers
- You will use **advanced** software for survey collection, data visualization, and statistical analysis (e.g., [NarraFirma](#))
- We will spend a **month** on narrative catalysis
- During sensemaking, project participants will work with **both stories and patterns**

PNI Practicum II: Larger-scale PNI



YOUR PROJECTS

For this project-based course to work, your projects must be:



THIS IS NOT A LECTURE COURSE

The PNI Practicum will follow a “flipped classroom” model. This first meeting will be the only one with a lecture in it. In all of our other meetings, I will **listen and respond** with feedback, advice, and answers to your questions.

Peer support is also very important in this course. We will *all* listen and respond.



“Students in the **flipped classroom** view digitized or online lectures as pre-class homework, then spend in-class time **engaged in active learning experiences** such as discussions, peer teaching, presentations, projects, problem solving, computations, and group activities.”

We will talk about what happened when you carried out the previous course activity. Everyone will get a chance to share their experiences.


Plan-out hour

Sandbox meetings will also happen **every other Tuesday (PPI) or Thursday (PPII)**, but they will start the *second* week of the course, and will alternate with the project progress meetings. They will also happen at 1700 and 2300 UTC, and again, you can come to either or both meetings.

In each sandbox meeting, I will facilitate an activity or exercise just like the ones you will be facilitating in your own projects. Each sandbox will **preview** an activity or exercise you might later use yourself. After the activity, if there's time, we will talk about how you intend to use it.




ZULIP CHAT

Messages are in **streams**, one for each part of the course




A few streams are for the whole course




The **materials** stream has all of your course materials to download.

Before the Zoom meetings


At least **skim the short readings**, so you are ready to discuss the relevant topics and activities.

During the Zoom meetings

Do **respect everyone's time** and attention. Don't dominate the discussion. Give everyone time to speak.

In the Zulip chat

Don't start off-topic or political discussions. **We don't have to agree** on everything to learn together.



In your project

Do put your time and energy into your project! You will learn about PNI in this course, but only if you actually **do a PNI project**.

About other people's projects

Be respectfully curious. Ask useful questions. Don't insult or make fun of people, their projects, or their mistakes.

Selections from 1-2 other books on relevant topics


Only the short readings are required. Please read or skim them before the project progress meetings. You can also read the medium or long readings, dip into them briefly, or save them for later.

COURSE LOG

The course log is a record of the course, **written by you**. There are many questions for you to answer as you go through each part of the course.

Please make this document your own. Add your own questions, notes, comments, thoughts, photos, recordings – whatever you think you will want to remember when you look back on the course later.

The course log is optional, but you may find it helpful.

Activity – Facilitate a Sensemaking Workshop

Help a group of people use your previously collected stories to make sense of your topic. Record the session and/or take notes on it. (If you do more than one workshop, you might want to copy and paste this table of questions for each workshop.)

What parts of the workshop were easier or harder than you expected? What felt natural to you, and what was difficult?
What part(s) of the workshop did the participants seem to like most and least?
What did you notice about the dynamics of the group? How did the energy flow throughout the workshop? Did it change as time went by?

These collection and sensemaking activities are **iterative** by design. The idea is to **build your skills by practicing** each type of facilitation three times, with discussion, feedback, and reflection in between.





IF YOU FALL BEHIND

It might be hard to schedule all of your participatory sessions on your project schedule. People might be busy. They might say they'll come but not show up. Or you might get sick or have a busy month. *That's fine.* You will be practicing story collection and sensemaking **three times each**. So even if things get delayed, you should still be able to complete all of your course activities.




You should **gather at least 24 (PPI) or 100 (PPII) stories** during the three story-collection parts of the course, ideally with one activity every two weeks. However, you will have **six weeks** to do this. If you end up collecting all of your stories in the last week of the six, that's okay. It will be a busy week, but you can do it.



You should **hold three sensemaking sessions**, ideally one every two weeks. But again, you will have **six weeks** to do this. If you end up holding all three sessions in the same busy week – or even if you can only fit in two sessions – that's okay. It won't ruin the course for you.
